WHAT IS SECRET AGENT SOCIETY?

SECRET AGENT SOCIETY (SAS) SMALL GROUP PROGRAM IS A BREAKTHROUGH PROGRAM FOR CHIDREN AGED BETWEEN 8 AND 12 TO IMPROVE THEIR SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL SKILLS.

It was created by Australian clinical psychologist, Dr Renae Beaumont, and is regarded as one of the most successful programs of its kind in the world.

SAS features an animated 'secret agent' computer game, Helpful Thought Missile action game, Challenger board game, and Secret Message Transmission Device game.

The entire program has been designed to captivate kids while they learn new social emotional skills in a fun way.

MULTIPLE RESEARCH EVALUATIONS SUPPORT THE EFFECTIVENESS OF SAS FOR IMPROVING THE SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL SKILLS OF CHILDREN IN CLINIC AND SCHOOL SETTINGS.

One university randomized controlled trial found 76 per cent of children who participated in SAS improved from showing clinically significant delays in social and emotional functioning to displaying these skills within the range of typically developing children.*
